RE: Report addressing State funding issues with the Monroe Township Board of Education and a recommendation for a legislative remedy

Dear Senator Greenstein,

Pursuant to your request, I have prepared this report to identify problems with State Aid funding and distribution to the Monroe Township Board of Education and to offer a recommendation to facilitate you in drafting legislation to help our district receive fair and more equitable funding.

Underfunded School Funding Formula and its effect on the Monroe Township Board of Education

The School Funding Reform Act of 2008 created a revised funding formula designed to equitably and predictably develop a way to distribute State Aid to provide constitutionally compelled educational standards. Over the past five years the only year that the State has fully funded this formula was the 2008/2009 school year. In the most recent 2012/2013 school year, according to Monroe Township Board of Education's State Aid report, the amount from page "STA" line (D) was \$9,539,569. This is the amount of funding that the formula calculates as proper to fund annual appropriations. Due to the CAP which restricts the award based upon its not being fully funded, automatically this award was reduced by \$4,403,688, line (G) labeled Excess Aid Reduction. That leaves the difference of \$5,135,881 projected total aid before adjustment. Unfortunately this reduced amount is not what the District received. The 2012/2013 amount is further reduced to \$2,637,528 because of a deferred installment process whereas it is spread over five years.

## Distribution of Aid to Districts

These allocations are based on two types of aid: <u>equalized</u> and <u>categorical</u>. Equalized Aid is allocated according to each District's ability to raise enough local revenue to support their adequacy budget. The equalization formula used in New Jersey considers both a community's property wealth (measured by equalized property valuation) and aggregate income (measured by State Income Tax) to determine the local ability to pay.

Categorical Aid is allocated regardless of a District's ability to raise local revenue. Categorized amounts are typically determined by multiplying the cost factor for a particular category by the number of students that qualify for the aid. Categorical Aid calculation is further determined and limited by adequacy status.

Monroe Township Board of Education only qualifies for Categorical Aid under these two types of aid and most of the award calculated is deferred.

The chart on the next page is from the Department of Education data and illustrates comparatively State Aid for the 2011/2012 school year which is the most recent year as far as available enrollments from the Fall Report.

As the chart illustrates, the Monroe Township Board of Education is one of only three districts in the County not to receive Equalized Aid at all.

Monroe's adequacy status which is negatively affected by unique variables including enrollment growth, Township demographics and infrastructure limitations requiring extraordinary courtesy busing, and an above average special education population greatly reduces Monroe's State Aid as calculated by the formula.

## Potential Legislative Remedy

Prior to the School Funding Reform Act of 2008, school districts located in municipalities in which at least 45% of the residents were 65 years or older were eligible for a State Education Aid category known as Senior Citizen Supplemental Stabilization Aid. This was repealed under SFRA2008 but new legislation regarding the Senior Citizen Supplemental Stabilization Aid has been introduced in the Assembly and in the Senate over the past several years as follows:

Assembly Bill Number 2184 was introduced in the Assembly on February 25, 2008 and was thereafter referred to the Assembly Health and Senior Services Committee. Senate Bill Number 1477 was introduced in the Senate on March 6, 2008 and was thereafter referred to the Senate Education Committee. No further action was taken with respect to these two bills.

Assembly Bill Number 309 was introduced in the Assembly on January 12, 2010 and was thereafter referred to the Assembly Health and Senior Services Committee. Senate Bill Number 120 was introduced in the Senate on January 12, 2010 and was thereafter referred to the Senate Education Committee. No further action was taken with respect to these two bills.

Assembly Bill Number 658 was introduced in the Assembly on January 10, 2012 and was thereafter referred to the Assembly Health and Senior Services Committee. Senate Bill Number 188 was introduced in the Senate on January 10, 2012 and was thereafter referred to the Senate Education Committee. No further action was taken with respect to these two bills.

These bills would have reinstated aid in the amounts of \$500 per pupil for Districts with municipal populations composed of more than 51% senior citizens aged 65 years or older.

What I would like to propose, after a process involving dialogue with Dr. Kenneth R. Hamilton, Superintendent of Schools, Board Members, and officials at the State Department of Education, is the following:

State Aid received pursuant to P.L. 2007, c.260 (c.18A:7F-43 et seq.) or any other law, for a school district in a municipality which has a population composed of more than one third (1/3) senior citizens age 65 or older according to the most recent federal decennial census their total Stabilization Adjustment Aid before CAP as stated on projected State School Aid form "STA" line (D) shall receive the total Stabilization/Adjustment Aid before CAP as stated on Projected State School Aid Form "STA" line (D).

An explanation of this legislation is that school districts within a municipality composed of more than one third (1/3) senior citizens age 65 or older according to the most recent federal decennial census shall receive their total projected State School Aid as calculated by the State Funding Formula. This affords a more complete aid award which is more responsive to the senior population and avoids the phase in as compared to current distributions subject to CAP. Monroe, as stated earlier would receive their full award of \$9,539,569 before excess aid reductions of \$4,403,688 and which the result would not be subject to a five year phase in as was the case in the 2012/2013 school year. This would award would fund and expedite additional full payment of \$6,902,041 to Monroe in 2012/2013 for example and would greatly aid in local property tax relief by reducing the levy.
