

## **PUFFINS**

There are 4 types of puffins, Atlantic puffin, horned puffin and tufted puffin live in the North Atlantic and pacific oceans. The last kind are rhinoceros auklet which breed in pacific waters from southeastern Alaska to Washington. Each spring, thousands of puffins return to the ocean islands to breed, the residents of the main village on Heimaey island formed a puffin control to keep the puffins safe if they wander into town. "2639 pufflings were brought into the Vestmannaeyjar Fish and Natural History Museum to be examined and then released" (Ainsworth).

Puffins have orange beaks and are often called the clowns of the sea or sea parrots because of their colorful beak and expressions. Puffin beaks change to a more duller color right before winter and return to the bright orange color before mating season. Also, the puffins don't just use their wings to swim and get fish for their mates, but can also fly for 55 mph, flapping 300-400 times a minute to stay in the air.

Puffins generally mate for life and have one egg per year, their babies are called pufflings. Puffins are sea birds that get food by driving in the ocean to get fish, much like penguins. Puffin parents can supply their baby with fish about 100 times a day. Puffins have tongues to catch and hold fish, in Britain a puffin set a record of 62 fish in its mouth at a time. Their favorite fish to eat include small fish, such as sand eels, herring, sand eels, hake, and capelin.

Puffins dig burrows in the ground in protected areas away from predators. Puffins live over 20 years, however the oldest puffin recorded was 36 years old. The leg bands to track some puffins erode in their salty habits or rocky areas so it is difficult to know the maximum age.

## SPRING IS NEAR



## **MTHS reaches NJ States VEX Robotics Competition**



Saturday, March 5<sup>th</sup>, the Monroe Township High School Robotics Team participated in their first ever VEX Robotics Competition(VRC) State championship at the Bell Labs Holmdel Complex. The team set up their station and began to formulate a plan. After seeing what teams they would be competing with and against, they formulated plans with their alliances to form strategies. Similar to the format of the MTHS Tournament, 30 second autonomous rounds were held before the main two minute driver control rounds. A teamwide effort was made to ensure the robot was running at maximum efficiency while taking it between competition challenges and skills challenges. After all qualifying rounds were completed, the top scoring teams got first pick on who their alliance would be in the elimination rounds. The MTHS Robotics Team had a one of a kind first experience and were immensely motivated by the recognition / certification of appreciation given at the March Board meeting for every team member. This is a great stimulus for the team to keep working and improving as they prepare for next year's competition.

2<sup>nd</sup> Place-Ms. Dillion/Ms. Mascali's 4A class (84 cans of canned ravioli)


